- Q. What is the third commandment?
- A. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless who taketh his name in vain.
- Q. What are we commanded by this?
- A. To avoid all false, rash, unjust, and unnecessary oaths; also, cursing, blaspheming, and profane words.
- Q. What is the fourth commandment?
- A. Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.
- Q. What are we forbidden by this commandment?
- A. All unnecessary work, and sinful profanation of the Sabbath day.
- Q. What is the fifth commandment?
- A. Honour thy father and mother.
- Q. What are we commanded by the fifth commandment?
- A. To love, honour, and obey our parents in all that is not sinful.

Q. Are we commanded to obey only our father and mother?

A. Not only them, but also our teachers, magistrates, and masters.

Q. What is forbidden by this commandment?

A. Contempt, stubbornness, and disobedience to our lawful superiors.

Q. And what is the duty of parents and other

superiors?

A. To take proper care of those under their charge, and to bring up their children in the fear of God.

Q. What is the sixth commandment?

A. Thou shalt not kill.

Q. What does the sixth commandment forbid?

A. Wilful murder, hatred, and revenge.

Q. Does it forbid strife?

A. Yes! as anger, quarrelling, and injurious words.

Q. What else?

A. Giving ear to scandal and showing a bad example.

Q. What is the seventh commandment?

A. Thou shalt not commit adultery.

Q. What are we forbidden by this?

A. All kinds of immodesty by looks, words, or actions.

Q. What is the eighth commandment?

A. Thou shalt not steal.

Q. What is forbidden by this commandment?

A. Unjustly taking away or keeping what belongs to others.

Q. What else?

A. All manner of cheating in buying or selling, or any other way of wronging our neighbours.

•Q. Must we restore ill gotten goods?

A. Yes! if we are able, or else the sin will not be forgiven.

Q. What is the ninth commandment?

A. Thou shalt not bear false-witness against thy neighbour.

Q. What is forbidden by this commandment?

A. False testimonies, rash judgments, and lies.

Q. What else?

A. All backbitings and detraction, or words and speeches by which our neighbour's honour or reputation is in any way hurt.

Q. What is he bound to do who has injured his neighbour by speaking ill of him?

A. He must make him satisfaction and restore his good name, as far as he is able.

- Q. What is the tenth commandment?
- A. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife; thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's goods.
- Q. What is forbidden by this?
- A. Covetous thoughts and unjust desires of our neighbour's goods and profit.

CHAPTER IV.

Of the Virtues.

- Q. What are the qualities on which religion is based?
- A. Faith, hope, and charity.
- Q. What is faith?
- A. A fervent belief in God, his wisdom, power and mercy, and in the revelation of his holy will.
- Q. What is hope?
- A. It is the expectation that God will grant all our proper desires.
- Q. What is charity?
- A. A feeling of universal good will to all mankind, because all are created by God.

- Q. How may true charity be shown?
- A. By feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, visiting and releasing the captive, sheltering the houseless, visiting the sick, and burying the dead.
- Q. Which are the two precepts of charity?
- A. "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul, with all thy strength, and with all thy mind;" secondly, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself."
- Q. Are there any others?
- A. Yes; admonishing the weak, instructing the ignorant, counselling the doubtful, comforting the sorrowful, bearing wrongs patiently, forgiving injuries, praying for all men.
- Q. Let me hear you express the love that you have towards God and your neighbours.
- A. O! my God, I love thee above all things with my whole heart and soul, because thou art infinitely good, and deserving of all love; I love also my neighbour as myself, for the love of thee; I forgive all who have injured me, and ask pardon of all I have injured.
